Purple Prairie Clover

Dalea purpurea

General: Small, native, warm-season legume

Height: 12-30"

Bloom: Small purple flowers circle a dense cone-shaped spike 1 to

2 inches long held high above leaves. Flowers open from the bottom to the top of the spike. Blooms in early to

mid summer.

Leaves: pinnately compound with odd number of leaflets (3-9,

usually 5). Each leaflet 1" long and 1/8" wide. Hairless.

Habitat: Found throughout most of the United States. Prefers full

sun with average to dry conditions (at least 15" annual precip). Tolerant of a wide variety of soil types. Very deep (6') taproot is slow to establish but drought tolerant.

Faunal: Attracts honey bees, native bees, bumble bees. One MN

study found no other prairie flower attracts as many bee

species as PPC. Host to Dogface Butterfly larvae.
